Facing Food Insecurity: Moving the Needle

Building Impact supports a wide range of social causes and organizations, but when it comes to food insecurity, our volunteers generated impact in many ways throughout 2022.

In the face of the highest increase in the cost for food in 40 years, Building Impact volunteers came together online, in their offices, and at community organizations to help end hunger and increase food access. BI provided nearly \$235K in value to hunger relief organizations, to increase their capacity in a time of growing need.

Virtual Volunteering

Throughout the holiday season, hundreds of volunteers donated their time to help support families with limited or uncertain access to adequate food. Using the Building Impact online volunteering platform, volunteers virtually created **Holiday Meal Boxes** for food pantries across the country to distribute to community members in need, providing extra community support and spreading holiday cheer.



Hybrid Volunteering & Donation Drives

For youth and families who rely on school-provided lunch and snacks, summer can make accessing nutritious foods challenging. To address this food access decrease, volunteers donated to the **Summer Hunger Drive** and created **Nutrition and Hydration Kits** for Boston youth attending the YES Summer Track and Field Program. Teams rallied online and in-person to make these two programs an impactful success!



In-Person Volunteering

On opposite sides of the country, volunteers helped bring comfort and hope to individuals impacted by serious illness. Volunteers came together in Boston at Community Servings and in Los Angeles at Project Angel Food to help prepare and package thousands of **medically tailored meals**. In both communities, this volunteer work helps advance the health-equity focused mission of these organizations.

Skills Based Programming: Professional Pathways with Year Up Interns




Throughout 2022, Building Impact volunteers met on Zoom with young adults participating in Year Up's virtual job training program to help close the opportunity divide.

Together they:

- Reviewed their resumes
- Shared networking tips
- Explored career paths
- Practiced interviewing skills

The responses from the Year Up participants and volunteers were overwhelmingly positive. In 2022, BI volunteers dedicated over **380 skilled volunteer hours** towards sharing their knowledge and skillsets with the next generation.

LEADING WITH IMPACT, **WITH MIT**





2022 marked the eighth year of Building Impact's partnership with MIT for the Leading with Impact program supporting the capacity-building for 25 nonprofit organizations.

During the spring semester, the Executive MBA program and the MBA students both had an opportunity to work on projects with local nonprofit organizations addressing challenges in operations, finance or design that were constraining their ability to reach their service goals, or expand to meet the growing need in the community for their services. This year's projects made a material difference for many of the nonprofit community organizations from restructuring the financial structure at Habitat for Humanity to offering access to capital to build more housing, to improving access to food choice at Centre Street Food Pantry.

100% of the nonprofits who participated in LWI indicated that they would recommend this program to other nonprofit organizations.
